It was a great surprise and with deep humility, I was awarded Life membership of the Renault Car Club of Victoria.

My history with the Renault marque started around 1968 when after being service crew to Captain Peter Janson from the Chrysler team, Peter campaigning a Hillman Hunter and us service crew using a V8 Valiant wagon (enough said about handling at speed on dirt). Janson then became Publicity Manager for Renault, and I was introduced to a Renault 16TS for the 1969 Southern Cross Rally. Love at first sight (or at first drive). 5 days and nights of handling on bitumen and dirt that was out of this world in those days. Brilliant lighting, superb comfort and a surefootedness I had never experienced. This front wheel drive, independent suspension and unequal wheelbase stuff was amazing.

Then love struck and Helen and I set up house and Mikee came along. I was working for T.A.B at the time and one of the ladies from Personnel said to me one day, "You own that Renault in the car park, and my friend (Steve Kaladarian as it turned out, who was on site as a Caterpillar engineer looking after our generators) has seen it. He has invited you to a Renault Car Club Concourse on etc etc" After a bit of extra polishing, I entered and was surprised and delighted to win. The trophy is a large piston and con rod mounted on a board.

I then joined the club, and have had the privilege to serve on the Committee and as Secretary and President.

Mikee and I campaigned Helen's R12 and later Daphne, a special built by Rob Allen, in the Victorian Motorkhana Championship. I managed a class win and Mikee second Junior. Then a restoration project, with an R4 purchased from Alpine Affaire, Colin Starke and Steve Kaladarian, which was a lot of fun. In company with Rob Ingram, I drove it to Adelaide for 2 Bay to Birdswoods. In the meantime, many visits to Jugiong. Both Mikee's and my names are on the trophy for Production Renault in 2 different centuries.

Having seen an Alpine, I was determined to own one. The opportunity arose again through Alpine Affaire, to purchase a 1989 GTA Turbo. This car was campaigned in the Victorian Hillclimb Championship and rewarded me with the Class win in 2016, 2017, & 2018.

I presently drive a Latitude as my road car, having owned R4, R16, R25 and Laguna. My toy at the moment, is a 1987 Alpine GTA Turbo.



I have many happy memories of past times in the Club and look forward to many more. I thank you all for the honour you have bestowed on me.

All you have to do is put you hand up






MEMBERSHIP BREAKDOWN

The membership of the club, given the issue of what has befallen the world, is in good shape. During the height of the pandemic a decision was made to charge reduced membership fees. The year just passed we elected not to increase fees as the issues still persisted. Membership appears not to be falling off a cliff as some had expected. There are the usual peaks and troughs with membership remaining reasonably consistent over the last 10 years (see graphic below)


To give the committee some idea of the demographics of our membership, our last membership form asked some *very basic* details, your gender and age of birth. Some reported these stats, others did not. A new category of family membership was



introduced the year before to try and promote an introduction to club inclusion with members 'not of legal driving age'. With that in mind the club has 177 members, with a 4:1 male/female ratio, and are broken down as such:

VEHICLES

As expected there are many flavours of the French marque owned by the membership. If a member reported that they drove, were restoring or even storing a model it was recorded (below). The Sport models (Megane & Clio) comprise over 25% of vehicles driven by membership with many members reporting multiple (4+) under stewardship.

Of particular note is that we now have our first recorded Renault EV, a Zoe.

PERMITTED VEHICLES

RCCV has 76 vehicles under permit. It is interesting to note that other marques, body types and in fact wheel numbers are represented in our permit list, with a truck, panel-van, 4WD and a motorbike listed. The rule is it has to be over 25 years old, in roadworthy condition and the person applying for a permit is a club member (with at least 1 years membership if permitting a 'foreign' make).

Vicroads called for amendments to the structure of permitted vehicles during the year, wanting to match Victoria's scheme to NSW with an entry level of 30+ years to be eligible to be on historic registration. The Victorian car clubs reacted with the answer that was a retrograde step and was not introduced. Beware that this will likely (in my opinion) to be attempted again. The privatisation of Vicroads may also bring this forward.

Continue to be a car club member and put the 'oldies' on permit and drive/display them proudly.



RCCV History to be made





David's R8 Gordini

I thought I'd share the story of my R8 Gordini, what is possibly the most important 8G in Australia.

60 R1135 R8 Gordinis were assembled in Australia during the 1960's, this is the last one made, car number 60 built in January 1970

Kays rent a car was the sponsor for the rally team and the final 20 cars were painted in their corporate colour daffodil yellow.

3 daff yellow cars were taken off the production line and became rally cars. Bodies were seam welded, gussets welded in, suspension reinforced, Engines enlarged to 1296cc Alpine spec, final drive ratio lowered, interior stripped out and roll bar fitted, navigation equipment fitted, these were the ultimate Gordinis.

The little cars were so successful that they dominated rallying and in 1970 won the Australian rally championship, 1st and 3rd, this car coming 3rd. The following year 1971 this car won the Victorian state championship. 1972 saw the introduction of the R12 Gordini so the R8's were sold off. They continued to dominate in private hands but eventually fell from grace and 2 of the 3 cars ended up as landfill. This car is the only survivor.





Here are a series of photos from it's rally days to when I pulled it out of it's shed where it sat for 35 years. The owner at the time wanted a traditional blue car with white strippes the stripped it and started painting it blue but lost inter-

est (luckily) and it sat for 35 years, Unfortunately for me the car had to be stripped and sand blasted to get the blue off and with no choice but a full resto it's off we go.









now fully restored back to the original car that dominated rallys in 1971, even the roll bar is the original one that was pulled out and sold in 1978, I found it some 800kms in a shed. The navigation gear is all original, the whole car is now back to it's 1971 rally days.


