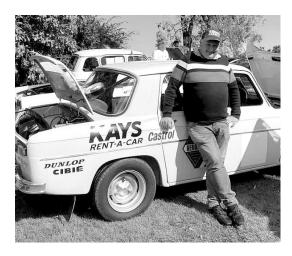

People talk about a car that they should have bought and put away because prices are rising, well that's the Clio 2, prices are already rising and there not even old enough for club plates yet. Like the other French iconic hot hatch, the Peugeot 205 GTi the Clio 2 will one day be out of peoples reach. we thank John Palace for organising the day.



19th of February was the 1st round of Rob Rov interclub hill climb at Rob Rov on Clintons Rd in Smiths Gully. A huge turn out and near perfect conditions for motorsport, about 90 cars enetered and 7 of them Renaults. Problem was, the fastest Renault wasn't one of us. Young Avrton Williams who is a memeber of the Alfa club runs a very well sorted Clio 3. Ayrton is young and fearless and the car is very well set up and we couldn't catch him. 1st of us was my son Chris Cavanagh in his RS250 wagon, 2nd David Bertuch, RS275 trophev. then me in the little red Megane diesel, followed by Glenn Armstrong RS250, Jerome Bain-King Fuego turbo and Geoff Rasmussen in Lucy the R4.

Chris's RS250 wagon is quite an amazing vehicle, Reneault didn't make them and Chris being a family man needed a station wagon so he built it out of a written off RS250. He reminds me of my brother Steve, back in the 70's he built his own rally cars, he'd take a Dauphine body, usually cost nothing as people were throwing them out, got

hold of a written off R10 and swap all the mechanicals across and go to the wreckers (Reno Spares now French Connection) and buy a second hand R16TS engine and a few weekends work he'd have a very competitive rally car that would beat others worth 10 times the amount. That little Dauphine was so quick that in a drag race it would keep up with my dads Porsche 911 up to about 130kph and the taller gearing of the Porsche would pull away. The Dauphine ran a standard R10 gearbox which is all vou needed for rallying. Light body, low gearing and a powerful engine was and good traction was all that was needed.

These days people tend to think todays high tech computerised vehicles can't be tampered with but Chris proved them wrong by building what he wanted in his garage at home, he was fastest club member in a car he built himself on a shoestring budget, a fantastic effort.

Another one worth mentioning is Jerome Bain-King, his Fuego is getting better sorted and Jerome was a little dishearted because he couldn't beat an uber eats delivery car but that uber car has 30 years newer techology and he was only a few tenths of a second slower, but he was was a full 2 seconds faster than the other 80's French sporty hatch. 205GTis were the untimate French drivers cars back in the 80s and he was much quicker, I thought that was a very good result.

It was sub zero with ice patches on the roads. I thought it brave for the owner to take it out especially with Cup 2 tyres that are notoriously unpredictable unless hot.

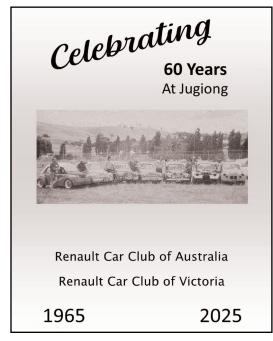
The other observation is how well it is put together. Dare I say German build quality??

A Brief History of the Renault Jugiong Competition

At a meeting between NSW and Victorian Renault car club members in Sydney in 1964 it was decided to hold a motorkhana between the two clubs every Australia Day weekend. The location was Jugiong, judged to be about half-way between Sydney and Melbourne. A club member had a relative, involved in the local Jugiong community, who secured the use of the park.

And so began a tradition that has been running since 1965. This year is the 60th time that the Jugiong Interstate Challenge will be run.

We believe this is the longest continually

run motorkhana in Australia. Please prove we are wrong.

The competition grew until Renault clubs from all over Australia were participating. The biggest number of competitors was 110 in the 1970s. Various competitions were held between NSW and Victoria, between the other states and for outright honours.

The Jugiong event has tapered off in numbers and these days fields are normally less than 20 in number. But this number comprises some of the top motorkhana drivers in the country.

There are generally five national champions, past and present, as well as state and class champions and families spanning three generations.

The weekend always started the day before the motorkhana with the First Beer Award. Initially this was at the Sir George Tavern at 10am in the morning. The person who bought the first beer poured won a pewter beer mug. That ended when the multitudes burst into the bar one weekend to find a member, staying at the Tavern, sitting at the bar drinking the first beer. We now use a marked glass. When

the Tavern closed the competition moved to a new drinking hole in town.

Well, traditions are traditions.

Nowadays, the First Beer is often held after the competition.

In the long forgotten past 10 tests were set up and competitors were only allowed one attempt at each test. These days we use 6 tests but allow 2 attempts at each. Another long-standing rule is no reversing tests. This allows the competition to be over around lunchtime and everyone can go and cool off at the swimming pool.

Jugiong is a tradition for Renault clubs.

Early in World War II. however. the factories were brought under German control, and many were heavily damaged by Allied bombings. Renault bought the Enstone-based team for the 2016 season, rebranding it Renault. In 2021, the team was renamed Alpine F1 Team and became part of the new Alpine business unit, with Renault retained as the engine nameplate



With Renault expanding outside of France and its colonial markets, Renault is becoming eminently popular. 1964 saw the Renault 8 Gordini launch with great sporting success and in 1972 the R5 makes its debut, going on to account for 60% of sales.



Renault is known for its role in motor sport, particularly rallying, Formula 1 and Formula E. Its early work on mathematical curve modeling for car bodies is important in the history of computer graphics.



Renault Emblème - a brand-new concept car

Renault Emblème was developed to maximise decarbonisation throughout its life cycle. It is a family car designed to slash CO2 eq. emissions from cradle to grave by 90%, compared with an equivalent vehicle toďav.

This shooting brake of elegant, flowing lines symbolises a design intended to optimise aerodynamics and maximise efficiency

Renault Emblème is driven by an all-electric powertrain powered by a dual power energy, designed to reduce carbon emissions without compromising on versatility. It combines a 40kWh battery for everyday use with a hydrogen fuel cell for longer journeys

VICTORIAN RENAULT



Renault 17 returns with head-turning concept

Renault will sadly not turn its stunning R17 concept car into a production model, and will instead display it at this year's Paris motor show. Renault has staked an early claim for 2024's best-looking concept at this year's Paris motor show with the retro-inspired R17 electric restomod x Ora Ito.

As a homage to the 1971 17, the R17 sports a similar two-door, fastback design, but swaps the 1.6-litre inline four-cylinder engine for a 201kW all-electric powertrain – now located in the rear.

Although the R17 features a carbon-fibre chassis and sleek lines for improved aerodynamics, Renault has not divulged acceleration figures or driving range for the show car.

Tipping the scales at 1.4 tonnes, the all-electric R17 weighs about as much as the latest automatic-equipped Megane RS, which can accelerate from zero-to-100km/h in 5.7 seconds thanks to its 221kW/420Nm 1.8-litre turbo-petrol four-cylinder.

As a 'restomod', the R17 actually uses the monocoque platform of the original 17 as a basis, and even features much of the same interior, windows, doors, and underbody. However, the seats have been updated, while four screens are also added (three for instrumentation, and one as a central display) to modernise the R17's interior aesthetic.

On the outside, the R17 pays tribute to its inspiration with four round headlights, frameless doors, and rear window louvres. "We kept the most distinctive design features of Renault 17, starting with the front end," he said. My aim was to add style and flow, but without altering the character of R17. You can still see the original Renault 17 and its sports coupé looks.

"We were also aiming for a light-hearted touch. Renault has a strong identity and I like that. You recognise a Renault when you see one, and this restomod is no exception to the rule."







POWERED BY RENAULT

1972 Jidé 1600S



This 1972 Jidé 1600 S is one of only approximately 130 cars ever made.

Designed by Jacques Durand and inspired by the GT40, these cars were considered Alpine competitors despite being priced much higher than

their similar compatriots. Campaigned extensively throughout Europe, the marque's most memorable win came at the 1972 Rallye du Poitou with Jean Ragnotti at the wheel.

This particular example is speculated to be the best left, having recently undergone a complete professional restoration.

Apart from auxiliary light positioning and a few other minor details, this one wears the same livery as Ragnotti's racer. Though many were privately prepped and entered into competition, there's no mention of this car's previous history.

Regardless of its past, the tribute livery looks fantastic on what is a brutally purposeful shape.

The rear three quarter view in particular is just fantastic, wide semi slick rubber protruding from wide, flat arch extensions leaving no doubts about the cars capabilities.

Inside things are pretty simple, and again very similar to an Alpine A110. A plain metal dash houses a few simple instruments, a handful of toggle switches, an electrical master switch and not much else. We can just make out the extremities of a full roll cage, which in conjunction with an exposed gearshift mechanism and fire extinguisher lend the tiny cabin a purely functional vibe.

Motivation comes from a 1.6 liter Renault R12 Gordini four cylinder, another similarity to its competition from Alpine. Said to weigh only 640 kg with a height of roughly one metre, it's small enough that the 140 HP or so on tap should be more than ample to throw it down the road with no shortage of speed.

Built around a composite semi monocoque integrating a tubular space frame, suspension is said to be rose joints with adjustable Bilsteins. Brakes are ventilated discs grasped by big AP calipers.

An interesting and unique alternative to an Alpine but only if you're under 5'10".

Footnote: Power came from an assortment of Renault engines, including the ones used in the R8, R8 Gordini, and R12 Gordini

Memoires a members recollections

I was happy to get my first car, a Morris Minor convertible in about 1966. It was a side valve with very little power. My petrol head friends at college suggested an engine transplant. A Peugeot 203 was suggested and I bought a complete unlicensed vehicle for the engine swap.

Our house in East Fremantle had no garage or carport but had a driveway. However in a moment of inattention I had an accident with the Morris so there were two unroadworthy vehicles in the driveway.

What to do? College gave me drawing skills, so I was able to draw a clubman style vehicle complete with a ladder chassis. The quote from a local engineer to construct the chassis was quite high for my student budget so I bought an arc welder and constructed the chassis. I was able to read various books and manuals to help with understanding the processes.

However I lacked full knowledge and I was recommended to talk with an imaginative engineer who had raced Peugeots. Bob Annear was willing to help and willingly shared his knowledge. He had built and raced a car based on a Lister Jaguar. Google gave me this comment: "Bob opted

for a space frame and a six cylinder 'grey' Holden motor with a huge GM diesel supercharger. When the bonnet was first lifted in the Caversham pits to a bunch of bent necks, David Van Dal famously quipped; "The engine drives the blower. What drives the car? Bob later changed the powerplant to a Peugeot engine.

My clubman was mainly constructed using Peugeot parts with some items coming from Morris. As a student I had very little money and learnt from my many mistakes.

The car was built in the open and on one occasion a young lady appeared from nowhere, my mother had sent her to talk with me. she asked "What are you doing?", I replied that I was filling the radiator with water, and was stunned by her question: Is it thirsty?"

Bob supplied me with many imaginative solutions to construction problems.

My clubman nose cone was shaped by expanded aluminium covered with fibreglass. Initially I made the front wheel guards using smooth tyres as a mould. However when I took the car to the police for licensing the inspector asked me to incorporate rubber "splash" guards.

On an occasion while reversing, the guard wedged itself against the tyre and the whole guard launched itself into the air. I changed the guard to be integral with the body as in the early MGs.

STH'N CROSS RALLY HISTORY

The Southern Cross Rally was for more than a decade Australia's pre-eminent international rally, attracting factory entries and big name drivers from overseas as well as Australia's best drivers.

The event ran every year in October from 1966 to 1980 inclusive, following a four night format. The competitive distance was generally about 2000 km. Only the first three editions came to Victoria.

The first Southern Cross Rally in 1966 was won by Victorians Harry Firth and Graham Hoinville in a Cortina. Barry Ferguson missed out on victory that year after an off on the final night but returned to win the following year with Dave Johnson in his VW. The lightning fast John Keran won in 1968 in a Volvo. Andrew Cowan won the Southern Cross Rally six times, an incredible record, and with three different co-drivers. His first victory was in 1969 with Dave Johnson in an Austin 1800. Johnson won again the 1970 co-driving for Barry Ferguson in a Torana. The Torana gained a second victory in 1971 with Colin Bond and George Shepheard. Cowan's other victories were all in Mitsubishies – a Galant in 1972 and the mighty Lancer from 1973 to 76. Datsun finally achieved victory in 1977 with Rauno Aaltonen together with Jeff Beaumont in a Datsun 710. Beaumont won again in the final edition in 1980 co-driving for Ross Dunkerton in a Datsun Stanza. Victorians George Fury and Monty Suffern won twice in 1978 and 1979, also in a Stanza.

1937 Renault Juvaquatre

Officially unveiled at the Paris show in 1937, the Juvaquatre was a thoroughly modern Renault, with independent front suspension, while the bodywork was all-steel and relatively streamlined, by the standards of the age. Always powered by engines measuring one litre or smaller, it was offered as a saloon, an estate, a van and – for taxi purposes – an extraordinary-looking compact MPV, as that particular body style would have been described decades later.

The estate and van became very significant in the immediate postwar era, when small Renaults all had rear-mounted engines which would have taken up valuable load space, and were therefore not suitable for conversion.

For that reason, Juvaquatres of these types (latterly renamed Dauphinoise) were still being manufactured as late as 1960, just before the front-engined Renault 4 rendered them superfluous.

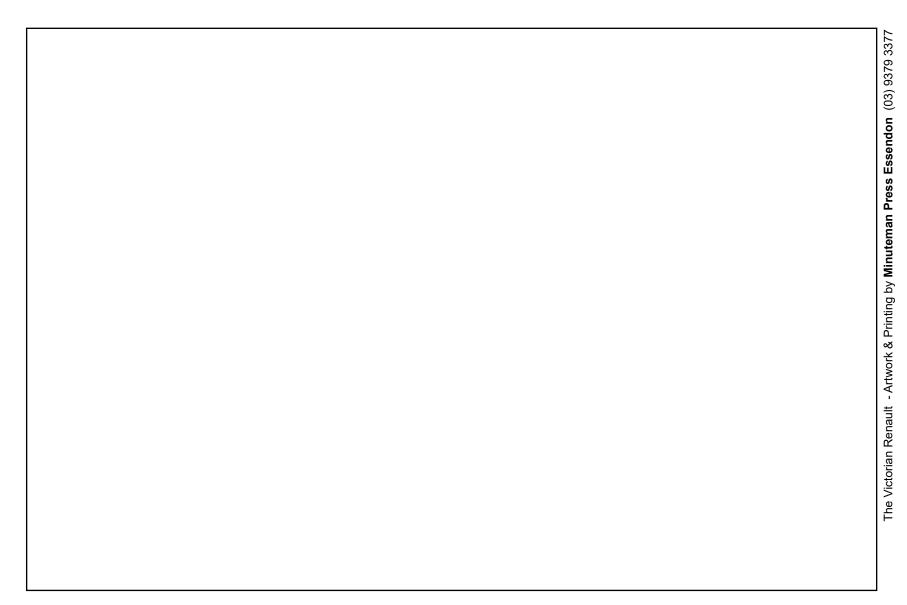
